#### I wonder. . .

Why are poinsettias so integral to American Christmas celebrations?

The poinsettia originally hails from Mexico, and was important to the Aztec people for medicinal reasons and as a dye for fabrics.

According to tradition, Franciscan monks used poinsettias for their nativity processions. The flower became known as "Flores de Noche Buena" or "flowers of the Holy Night" from a popular legend. The story tells of a young girl who was going to church to see the nativity on Christmas Eve. She was sad because she had no gift to offer the Christ Child. Her cousin told her that Jesus sees the love in the gift more than the gift itself, so she collected a bouquet of weeds along the roadside for the Baby Jesus. When she laid the flowers at the foot of the manger in the church, they transformed into beautiful poinsettias.

They earned their common name, poinsettia, from the first US Ambassador to Mexico, Joel Robert Poinsett. He brought the flower back to his home in South Carolina. He cultivated the plant and shared it. Eventually, a friend began selling the plant commercially, and advertised by giving poinsettias to popular television programs for their Christmas decorations.

December 12 is National Poinsettia day. Poinsettias are the best-selling potted plant in the United States.



Contrary to urban legend, poinsettias are not toxic to people or pets. Eating the leaves could cause an upset stomach, and the latex can cause skin irritation, but they won't kill you.


